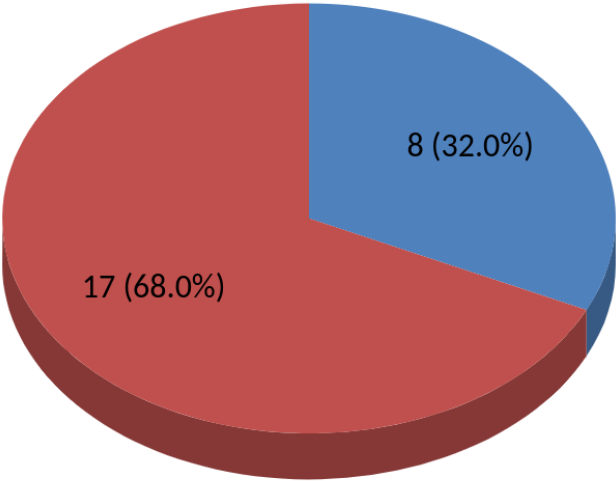


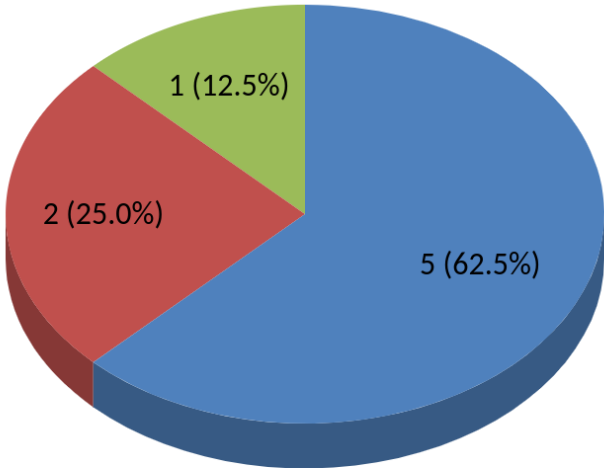

Did you pick up a paper copy or did you see it online? (Base 25)



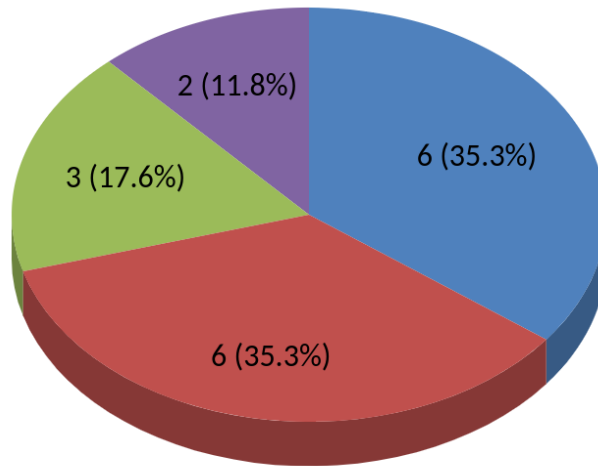

Where did you find it? (Tick all that apply) (Base 17 responses)

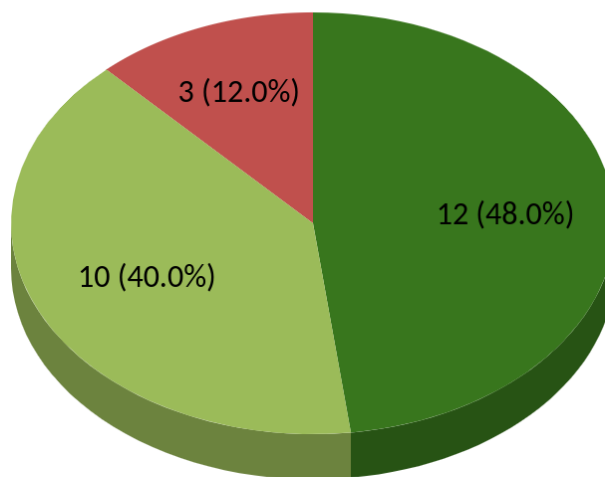

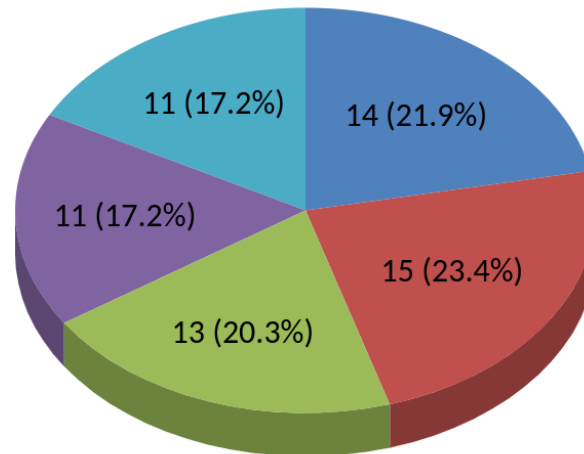

- No information on disability access to any of the venues. e.g. Benthal has a step to the front door of the play centre. Printing in white on a coloured background is harder to read; and for some sight impairments impossible. Printing in dark pink on a light pink background is also hard to distinguish. Layout for activities could be clearer especially the libraries section; maybe add a listing by dates.
- The activities were limited. I have a son with autism and looking through there was only forest road which provided activities for people his age for only a few hours in the afternoon
- The guide provides the breath of paid and free activity across the borough.
- I Used to see the website with lots of information including special needs activities.

- Very useful in having extra information and updates which has improved information that is provided. The only thing is that it should say the cost of the food hub for free meals for kids.

- Makes things more accessible to people with disabilities more
- Maybe specialist sessions for young people with disabilities. I wouldn't feel safe leaving my son for a drop in session without there being specific planned activities for them.
- More activities
- Need staff to be there for SEND children with any activities.

- Proactive link with TRAS, service providers and local charities for up to date events and shout out to same to update the social media platforms
- Also add where alternative provision is available for children who would normally receive a free lunch"
- There is too much crammed into one document. I'd like to be able to get a document for just my needs e.g. Early Years, Primary, Secondary and Post 16.
- To assist parents to plan activities for the summer, the guide should be available 3-4 weeks before the end of term.
